

Contributing to Local Food System

More than 81,000 pounds of food scraps have been composted through a collaboration between Copley Hospital and Black Dirt Farm in Greensboro Bend. This composting effort helped fertilize six acres of mixed vegetable crops at the farm. Now in its second year, the program has expanded to include recycling more than food scraps.

Lynn Pasette of Food Services took it upon herself to help staff and visitors understand what could be composted. "Since many do better with visual props, I created a display board of what not to compost," Pasette said.

The display boards are positioned by the dish room where people can easily toss food scraps and items while returning their dirty dishes. "It can't be much simpler than that," enthuses Pasette. "We use locally sourced food whenever we can and our composting effort is another way we can contribute to the local food system."





3D Technology for Better Outcomes

3D technology is being used extensively by Mansfield Orthopaedics. The practice offers total joint replacement which use 3D technology to create implants that specifically match each individual's anatomy. The technology is also helping surgeons prepare for surgery. They use 3D pre-operatively to visualize a complex procedure virtually before performing the actual surgery.

John Macy, MD has specialized in treating disorders and injuries of the shoulder at Copley since 2001. He performs approximately 100 shoulder replacements a year and uses 3D technology as part of his preparation. "The 3D software allows me to create an anatomical reconstruction from the patient's CT Scan and perform the implantation virtually," Dr. Macy says. This surgical preciseness allows Dr. Macy to make critical decisions before surgery. "It's a great tool, especially when facing a difficult reconstruction involving severe deformities."

"The benefits of 3D technology include less bone loss, shorter surgery time, and more accuracy to place the components precisely," says Dr. Macy. He feels this exactness will improve long-term outcomes for the patient.
